Role of Women in the Industrial Revolution - History ...

Frederick Engels, writing in the late nineteenth century, thought that the Industrial Revolution increased women's participation in labor outside the home, and claimed that this change was emancipating. 1 More recent historians dispute the claim that women's labor force participation rose, and focus more on the disadvantages women experienced during this time period. 2 One thing is certain: the Industrial Revolution was a time of important changes in the way that women worked.

Women Workers and the Industrial Revolution, 1750-1850

Women in Industrial Work By 1910 women made up almost one third of the workforce. Work was often on a part-time or temporary basis. It was argued that if women had the vote Parliament would be forced to pass legislation that would protect women workers.

Because of men's dislike for factory work, many of the first workers in Ohio's factories were women. In factories, women routinely faced discrimination. Employers commonly paid women one-half to two-thirds of what a man doing the same job received. The wages were pitiful.

The Impact of the Industrial Revolution on Women

Women during the Industrial Revolution. Women faced different demands during the industrial age to those that they face today. Women of the working classes would usually be expected to go out to work, often in the mills or mines. As with the children and men the hours were long and conditions were hard.

The War Manpower Commission, a Federal Agency established to increase the manufacture of war materials, had the task of recruiting women into employment vital to the war effort. Men's attitude towards women in the work force was one challenge to overcome but, surprisingly, women's own ideas about work outside the home had to change as well.

The Lowell mill girls were young female workers who came to work in industrial corporations in Lowell, Massachusetts, during the Industrial Revolution in the United States. The workers initially recruited by the corporations were daughters of New England farmers, typically between the ages of 15 and 35.

One of the most important women labor leaders of this period was Sarah Bagley. Born in Meredith, New Hampshire, Bagley worked as a common school teacher before moving to Lowell in 1836 to work in the mills. She worked in the factories for nearly nine years, and spent much of her time conducting a free evening school for women workers and writing.

Rights of Women

Between 1830 and 1860, women remained a key labor force for this growing industry. Mill superintendents paid recruiters to circulate through northern New England and to bring suitable young women to work in their mills.

Industrial Revolution: Women for Kids

In general, industrial workers were paid very small amounts and struggled to survive. For example, adult men were paid around 10 shillings per week, while women were paid 5 shillings for the same work, and children were paid just 1 shilling. In comparison, families were usually charged 5 shillings per month for rent.

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
